## October treats at the CCPA

Don't miss an exciting October lineup at the Cerritos Center for the Performing Arts (CCPA).

In the tribute show "Sweet Caroline – The Music of Neil Diamond," Jay White pays homage to the icon that "The New York Times" called the "Marathon Man of Pop." Legend Neil Diamond's career spans five decades, with record sales soaring over 125 million globally. The Grammy-Golden Globe-American Music award winner and Songwriters and Rock & Roll Halls of Famer captivated music fans with hits such as "Love on the Rocks," "Hello Again," "I'm a Believer," "America" and the timeless "Sweet Caroline." Tickets start at \$40 for the 8 p.m. show on Friday, October 4.

Ever since LeAnn Rimes won the "Best New Artist" Grammy at age 14, the Country music songstress has continued to enthrall fans all over the world. Enjoy an acoustic take on her timeless No. One hits, including "How Do I Live," "I Need You" and "Can't Fight the Moonlight." The multi-Platinum singer's triumphs also include the dance songs "Long Live Love," "Love Is Love Is Love" and "Love Line" and the album "god's work," which "Variety" magazine named to its "Best Albums of 2022" list. A former judge and coach on the popular television competition "The Voice," he also scored a Grammy for "Best Traditional R&B Performance" for "Fool for You." Ticket prices start at \$64.

## Contract awarded for the preparation of a Citywide Strategic Plan

The Cerritos City Council has awarded a \$48,250 contract to Tripepi Smith, a leading public affairs and local government consultancy, to facilitate the development of a comprehensive Strategic Plan for the City of Cerritos. The Strategic Plan will outline strategic goals that the City will strive to achieve over the next three to five years. This plan will serve as a roadmap for prioritizing the City's efforts and aligning the City Council, City staff, and the broader community around a shared vision for the future.

The Strategic Plan will incorporate significant input from Cerritos residents, the business community, and City staff through the implementation of community workshops. The first community workshop will be on Saturday, October 19 from 9 to 11 a.m. at the Cerritos City Council Chamber, and the second workshop will be on Wednesday, October 23 from 6 to 8 p.m. in the Malibu Room at Cerritos Park East. Tripepi Smith will lead the effort with a comprehensive engagement strategy that includes distributing an online feedback survey with the final report being presented to the City Council in December.

## Free emergency response training offered

The Cerritos Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) is offering disaster and emergency training on Friday, November 15 from 5 to 9 p.m.; Saturday, November 16 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; and Sunday, November 17 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Designed to help residents in the event of a disaster or other emergency, the CERT program offers training in disaster preparedness, CERT organization, disaster medical operations, disaster psychology, fire safety and utility controls, light search and rescue, terrorism and disaster simulation. When emergencies occur, CERT members are able to provide critical support to first responders, give immediate assistance to victims and organize volunteers at a disaster site.

Participants are required to wear closed-toed shoes and long pants for safety purposes and attend all three sessions to receive the CERT certification. Those under age 18 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

## Make your home earthquake-ready

Californians live in earthquake country and while tremors can strike at any time without warning, there are ways to make your home safer.

- Strap down heavy objects: Secure television sets, computers and stereos. Use buckles and safety straps to keep oversized objects from moving during the shaking.
- Anchor and brace: Tall items (such as bookcases, entertainment consoles, file cabinets, dressers and large appliances like refrigerators) can tip over. Use flexible fasteners to anchor them to the studs in the wall. Use a metal bracing kit to strap the water heater to wall studs. Use a brace that is secured to the ceiling joist for ceiling fans, chandeliers and light fixtures to keep them from falling in a quake.
- Install child safety latches: Cabinet doors and drawers can swing vigorously during intense shaking, causing injuries and destruction. Installing latches on cabinet doors and drawers prevents contents like glasses and dishes from flying out and causing injuries and damage.
- Hire an inspector: If your home was built before 1992, when more earthquake-resistance standards were introduced, hire a professional to inspect your home. Even homes constructed after 1992 should be checked to ensure that structural integrity is maintained.
- Rearrange furniture: Position beds near interior walls and away from windows. Store heavy items on low shelves to prevent them from falling during a tremor and causing injuries or property damage. Don't hang heavy items (such as mirrors, plants and framed artwork and pictures) above beds, couches, chairs or in places where people are likely to be sitting or sleeping. Use closed hooks or adhesive tabs to hang pictures, art or mirrors on walls.
- Secure knickknacks: Quickly, safely and affordably secure decorative items with adhesives such as putty and Velcro.
- Store hazardous chemicals properly: Hazardous household chemicals (bleach, gasoline and fertilizer) should be stored far away from furnaces and stoves so they can't tip over and catch fire during a quake.
- Clear a path: Keep all forms of exits clear and easily accessible.
- Add flexible connections: Make sure appliances have flexible gas or electrical connections so they won't break and cause other hazards like gas leakage or fires during an earthquake. Know how to turn off your utilities, including gas, water and electricity.
- Check the chimney: Have your chimney inspected by a licensed civil engineer for stability and safety – especially in homes built before 1960.
- Assess the foundation: Have a licensed civil engineer ensure that your home is bolted to the foundation; this is particularly important if your home was built before 1935. If your home is built on a raised foundation, make sure that it has shear plywood walls in the crawlspace, rather than the older-style cripple walls.
- Consider insurance: Consider buying earthquake insurance since most homeowner's policies do not cover earthquake damage. ■

## Homeowners' Exemption program provides property tax savings

The Los Angeles County Assessor's Office Homeowners' Exemption (HOX) program reduces the assessed value of a home or condo by \$7,000 for tax purposes, which translates to a reduction of \$70 annually to a homeowner's property tax bill.

The property must be the owner's principal place of residence as of January 1, and an application must be submitted in order for a homeowner to qualify. Applications received after February 15 are prorated for that year, but the homeowner will receive the full amount the following years. The savings will continue until a change is recorded.

## City ordinance regulates use of leaf blowers

Under City ordinance, the use of gas-operated leaf blowers in any residential area and in commercial areas within 400 feet of any residential area in the City is restricted to the hours of 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturdays and 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sundays and legal holidays. The City ordinance regulating these hours was designed to protect residents from excessive noise caused by such equipment.

Leaf blowers should not direct debris onto adjacent parcels or lots. Such debris should be removed and disposed of properly to prevent dispersion by wind or other similar means. Piles of leaves left in the gutters can clog storm drains and cause flooding. In addition, leaves in storm drains decompose and grow bacteria that can travel into the ocean. ■

## Join Neighborhood Watch

Residents are encouraged to join the Neighborhood Watch in Cerritos, a joint effort by community members and the Cerritos Sheriff's Station/Community Safety Center to fight crime and protect property. One of the oldest crime-prevention programs, it serves as the eyes and ears of the Sheriff's Department and has proven instrumental in keeping communities safe.

Contact the Community Safety Division at (562) 916-1266 to see if a Neighborhood Watch group has been formed in your neighborhood. If there is an established group, you will be provided with the name and phone number of the Watch Captain.

If there is no active group yet in your area, the Community Safety Division will help you and your neighbors start one. Ideal Neighborhood Watch groups are typically small – usually 15 to 20 households – to simplify communication among participants. A designated block captain will be responsible for acting as the liaison between a neighborhood and the Cerritos Sheriff's Station/Community Safety Center.

While the Community Safety Division and Sheriff's Department will assist in many ways, the success of Neighborhood Watch depends largely on resident involvement. Participants will receive Neighborhood Watch signs to post, alerting potential criminals that others are watching out for your home. Members of the watch group monitor their neighborhoods, communicate regularly with deputies and meet with neighbors routinely to stay current on crime trends and information. If a residential crime pattern is identified in the area, deputies will notify the group of what to look out for and suggest prevention strategies.

## Tips to stay safe on Halloween

For a safe and fun Halloween, follow these tips:

- If you forgo door-to-door trick-or-treating, consider attending the City's Halloween Festival from 5 to 9 p.m. on Thursday, October 31 at the Los Cerritos Center.
- Your children's costumes should be fire-retardant and non-restrictive to allow free movement and uninhibited vision. Masks should not hinder a child's breathing.
- Provide adequate warm clothing under the costume to protect against cold weather if necessary.
- Always remain in familiar territory.
- When going door-to-door, travel in groups with at least one responsible adult.
- Use flashlights, glow sticks or lighted wands to help you see and be seen.
- If a home does not have a porch light turned on, the residents likely do not want to be disturbed.
- Use discretion in determining which homes children should approach.
- Obey all pedestrian traffic laws. Cross at intersections and consider the existing street lighting. Keep the group together; kids can get caught up in the excitement and may run ahead of the group.
- Carefully inspect all items received before anything is eaten. Throw away treats that are not securely wrapped by the manufacturer.
- Consider only eating candied apples or other homemade treats if you know the person who prepared them.
- If you will be passing out candy, secure pets, remove all obstructions from the path to your porch and avoid using any open flame near the door. ■

## Take preventative steps against mosquitoes

As temperatures continue to rise, vector control experts stress the need for the public to take preventative steps against mosquitoes.

Mosquitoes can transmit diseases such as West Nile virus, which can cause debilitating illness and death to humans as well as birds, horses and other wildlife. Twenty percent of people infected with West Nile virus will exhibit flu-like symptoms, and one in 150 people infected will require hospitalization. There is currently no cure or vaccine for the virus.

The Greater Los Angeles Vector Control District (GLACVCD), a local government and public health agency dedicated to reducing populations of public health vectors and preventing human infection associated with mosquito-transmitted diseases, has issued the following tips to stay safe.

- Eliminate standing water around the home. It takes as little as five days for mosquito eggs to hatch into biting adults.
- Many children play sports or are outdoors from late afternoon to the evening hours, when mosquitoes are most active. Anyone outside during these hours should wear long-sleeved shirts and pants and use insect repellent containing DEET, Picaridin and oil of lemon eucalyptus.
- To help West Nile Virus surveillance and control efforts, report dead birds at westnile.ca.gov.
