

CCPA welcomes 2025 with jubilant January lineup

Kick off the new year right with a January jackpot of exciting shows at the Cerritos Center for the Performing Arts (CCPA).

Elvis has not left the building! "Elvis: The Concert of Kings" is sure to get audiences "All Shook Up" as three of the best tribute artists bring "The King" back to life. The sizzling night is packed with his biggest hits from the '50s, '60s, and '70s. Think "Jailhouse Rock," "Hound Dog," "Suspicious Minds," and "Are You Lonesome Tonight?" With tickets starting at only \$64, this concert is a must-see! Catch it on Friday, January 10 at 8 p.m.

It's an afternoon packed with laughs when Rita Rudner and Gary Mule Deer take the CCPA stage on Sunday, January 12. Rudner's comedy routines about life, men, and relationships have earned her acclaim, fans, and an American Comedy Award. The comedienne inspired HBO's "Born to Be Mild" and "Rita Rudner: Married Without Children." Grand Ole Opry inductee Mule Deer was called "the funniest man on the planet" by "Entertainment Tonight." That Motown Band delivers all your favorite tunes (think "Heat Wave," "Ain't Too Proud to Beg," "Baby Love," "Ain't No Mountain High Enough," and "My Girl") live! The Modern Gentlemen puts

its spin on No. One hits from The Beach Boys, The Beatles, Queen, The Bee Gees, and Frankie Valli & The Four Seasons. The Modern Gentlemen's albums include "The Modern Gentlemen: Volume 1" and "Happiest Days." The Modern Gentlemen will perform first. Timely removal of Christmas lights and decorations required

Residents are reminded to remove all Christmas lights and decorations in a timely fashion. The Cerritos Municipal Code requires that decorations and lights be removed within 15 days after a holiday to maintain the City's park-like appearance. Therefore, lights should be removed by Thursday, January 9.

Christmas tree recycling offered for residents

Residents in single-family homes can recycle their Christmas trees beginning Thursday, December 26 through Friday, January 17 by placing them at the curb for pick-up by 7 a.m. on their trash collection days. The trees will be composted or used for the Los Angeles County Sanitation District's daily landfill cover. Trees to be recycled should not contain any lights, tinsel, nails, metal stands or decorations, and should not be placed in bags. Trees more than 4 feet tall should be cut in half. Flocked trees will be accepted. Businesses in Cerritos or residents living in apartments or condominiums can place trees next to their trash bin for collection. City Council approves appointment of Cerritos City Clerk

The Cerritos City Council on Thursday, December 12 approved the hiring of Cynthia Nava as City Clerk. Nava, who brings 22 years of administrative experience in city government, was selected following a search from an independent firm retained by the Council. She had been Acting City Clerk since the retirement of Vida Barone in September.

"The Cerritos City Council is pleased to approve the hiring of Cynthia Nava to lead the City Clerk's Office," said Cerritos Mayor Naresh Solanki. "Additionally, we'd like to express our gratitude for her service these past several months as Acting City Clerk and throughout her career with the City."

Nava first joined the City of Cerritos in 2002 in the Building and Safety Division. She advanced through the organization, supporting the Recreation Services Division before joining the City Clerk's Office in 2018, giving her a unique perspective on the many facets of the City. Nava received her Bachelor's Degree from California State University, Fullerton, where she also received a Multiple Subject Teaching Credential. She holds a Master's Degree in Public Administration from California State University, Dominguez Hills.

"I would like to share my sincere thanks to the Cerritos City Council for this appointment and their support of the City Clerk's Office," said Nava. "I'm also appreciative of the guidance and collaboration through the City Manager's Office and all departments during this transition. I'm excited to continue working alongside our staff, residents and government partners to build upon the strong foundation laid by my predecessor and enhance our service to the Cerritos community."

2025 Election Dates: Cerritos General Municipal, State Special Primary

Cerritos voters have the opportunity to participate in separate elections at the City and State levels in the coming months.

The next Cerritos General Municipal Election will take place on Tuesday, March 4, 2025. The ballot will feature races for three Cerritos City Council seats, for full four-year terms, and two proposed Charter Amendment Measures. Each voter will receive a vote-by-mail ballot for this election pursuant to State law. No return postage is required. Voters will have several options, including an in-person voting experience, to cast their ballots beginning Monday, February 3, 2025. The last day to register to vote for the March election is Monday, February 17, 2025. Voters wishing to vote in person at City Hall during the voting period for the Tuesday, March 4, 2025 Cerritos General Municipal Election should bring with them their vote-by-mail ballots.

The public is also advised that the recently called California State Senate District 36 Special Primary Election will be conducted on February 25, 2025. Cerritos voters will be receiving a separate ballot for this election from the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters, and should pay special attention to the completion and placement of vote-by-mail ballots in their appropriate envelopes.

Join Neighborhood Watch

Residents are encouraged to join the Neighborhood Watch in Cerritos, a joint effort by community members and the Cerritos Sheriff's Station/Community Safety Center to fight crime and protect property. One of the oldest crime-prevention programs, it serves as the eyes and ears of the Sheriff's Department and has proven instrumental in keeping communities safe.

Contact the Community Safety Division at (562) 916-1266 to see if a Neighborhood Watch group has been formed in your neighborhood. If there is an established group, you will be provided with the name and phone number of the Watch Captain.

If there is no active group yet in your area, the Community Safety Division will help you and your neighbors start one. Ideal Neighborhood Watch groups are typically small – usually 15 to 20 households – to simplify communication among participants. A designated block captain will be responsible for acting as the liaison between a neighborhood and the Cerritos Sheriff's Station/Community Safety Center. While the Community Safety Division and Sheriff's Department will assist in many ways, the success of Neighborhood Watch depends largely on resident involvement. Participants will receive Neighborhood Watch signs to post, alerting potential criminals that others are watching out for your home. Members of the watch group monitor their neighborhoods, communicate regularly with deputies and meet with neighbors routinely to stay current on crime trends and information. If a residential crime pattern is identified in the area, deputies will notify the group of what to look out for and suggest prevention strategies. City Council approves appointment of Cerritos City Attorney

The Cerritos City Council on Thursday, December 12 approved the hiring of Pam Lee as City Attorney. Lee, who brings 17 years of service in legal affairs, is an Equity Partner with Aleshire & Wynder law firm in Orange County. She currently serves as the City Attorney for the Cities of Calabasas and Hesperia.

"The City Council is pleased to welcome Pam Lee to Cerritos to lead the City Attorney's Office," said Cerritos Mayor Naresh Solanki. "We look forward to her counsel as part of our commitment to providing high-quality community support services."

Lee's legal affairs background includes service with the cities of Rialto, Lynwood, and as the Assistant/ Interim City Attorney for the City of Cerritos. Over her career, she has successfully argued and defended municipal litigation matters in State and Federal courts, including successfully arguing an eminent domain/regulatory takings case before the California Supreme Court. Most recently, Lee won an important lawsuit on behalf of charter cities against the State challenging the constitutionality of SB 9, a State law that in essence eliminated single family residential zones. The City of Cerritos participated in that lawsuit via an amicus brief.

"I'm excited to once again serve the City of Cerritos and am thankful to the City Council for their consideration and support," said Lee. "I am looking forward to working on behalf of staff and the Cerritos community and bringing my passion for public service to the City Attorney's Office."

"Ms. Lee brings an extensive legal background in public agency law, land use and planning, affordable housing, and labor and employment matters. We're pleased to have her rejoin the City of Cerritos and support our strategic efforts," said City Manager Robert A. Lopez.

Bill Ihrke, Government and Regulatory Partner with the Rutan & Tucker, LLP law firm, will continue to support the City as Special Legal Counsel. His service with Cerritos includes representative counsel in cases related to housing projects and commercial vehicle traffic. In 2024, Ihrke and the Rutan & Tucker team successfully defended the City's proper implementation of a vehicle weight restriction ordinance, ensuring city control of truck traffic on local streets in a published, precedent-setting appellate opinion.

"On behalf of the City, I'd like to extend our collective appreciation to Mr. Ihrke and the Rutan & Tucker team for their dedicated service to Cerritos," said Lopez. "His support of the City in various legal matters has strengthened how we serve the residents and businesses in our community. The City looks forward to Mr. Ihrke's continued partnership as our Special Legal Counsel."

Under the City's Charter and governing documents, the City Council directly hires the City Manager, City Attorney, and City Clerk. The Cerritos City Attorney's Office provides general legal counseling services to the City, City Council, committees and employees.

AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH LECTURE SERIES

Please join the Cerritos Library as we celebrate African American History Month with special lectures featuring Dr. M. Keith Claybrook, Jr., Associate Professor, Department of Africana Studies at California State University, Long Beach; Dr. Alice Nicholas, Africologist and Assistant Professor, Department of Africana Studies at California State University, Long Beach; and Dr. Natalie Sartin, Department Chair of Black/ Africana Studies at Cerritos College. These lectures will examine the extensive history of various forms of African American resistance labor in the United States, including abolitionist efforts, civil rights activism, and student movements. Renew annual parking permit online

Cerritos residents can renew their annual parking permit for 2025 or request an overnight parking permit 24-hours-a-day, seven-days-a-week, online at safercerritos.us.

City parking permits are free of charge and must be clearly displayed on the driver's side dashboard of the vehicle (left corner) from 3 a.m. until 5 a.m. A vehicle displaying a valid California DMV Disabled Person Placard does not require an overnight parking permit. A parking permit does not exempt a vehicle from the City's street sweeping ordinance (10.12.065 CMC), which states: "The parking of any vehicle on any street during designated days and times for street sweeping is prohibited."

The parking permit criteria allow two-car garage households with five vehicles and four licensed drivers to qualify for a second annual parking permit. Threecar garage households with seven vehicles and six licensed drivers qualify for a second parking permit. For more information, contact the Community Safety Division at (562) 916-1266. ■

Be cautious of coyotes in Cerritos

From limiting access to outdoor food sources to proper pet supervision, residents can follow several precautions to help avoid encounters with coyotes:

- · Feed pets indoors.
- Eliminate potential food and water sources, such as fallen fruit or standing water.
- Keep yards free of thick brush and weeds.
- Enclose the bottoms of porches and decks.
- Keep dogs on a leash at all times when outdoors.

City saves drinking water by irrigating with recycled water

Committed to the preservation of the environment and conservation of water, the City of Cerritos has taken steps to conserve natural resources through a recycled-water distribution system. Cerritos irrigates more than 200 acres of City-owned property – including most parks, parkways, decorative fountains and medians – with recycled water.

The use of recycled water saves about 722 million gallons of potable drinking water annually and is billed monthly at about half the cost of drinking water. In addition to being used on City-owned property, the recycled water is used to irrigate schools, a county park, cemeteries, freeway landscaping, and some privately owned landscaped areas. Originating from industries, businesses and homes, the waste water is treated by a three-stage process by the Sanitation District before being used for irrigation.

Keep small animals inside or supervised when outdoors. A fenced yard will not protect small animals because coyotes can easily scale residential fences. Domestic dogs are especially vulnerable to coyote attacks. Adult coyotes are mainly active at night or in the early morning hours, while young coyotes are often active during the day. California coyotes have adapted to residential neighborhoods, parks and open spaces in urban and suburban areas. They are especially prevalent in areas bordering a flood channel.

Residents who see a coyote in their neighborhood should try to scare it away by shouting, throwing rocks, blowing portable air horns or acting in other aggressive ways in order to reinforce the coyote's fear of people. Motion-sensitive lights on houses or outbuildings may also deter coyotes from approaching.

If an aggressive or fearless coyote approaches you or your pet, consider the following tips:

- Shout in a deep voice.
- Wave your arms.

Residential organic waste recycling program in effect

The City's residential organic waste recycling program expands the list of items to be placed in your green trash cart to include both green waste and food waste. Below are lists of acceptable items to dispose of in your green cart.

Green Waste:

- Flower and hedge trimmings
- Grass clippings
- Leaves and branches
- Lumber, scrap wood and plywood (not painted or treated)
- Weeds

Food Scraps:

- Bread, rice and pasta
- · Cheese and dairy
- Coffee grounds and filters
- Fruits and vegetables
- Flowers and herbs
- Meat, bones and poultry
- Seafood and soft shells
- Pet food (non-medicated)

Food-Soiled Paper:

(Must be 100 percent fiber-based. No materials with petroleum-based plastic, wax or bioplastic coating, liner or laminate.)

- Food-stained paper
- Paper egg cartons
- · Paper napkins and kitchen paper towels
- Pizza boxes
- Plates

- To-go boxes (no coating)
- Wood and fiber-based utensils

Unacceptable Items for Green Cart:

- All plastics
- Cacti, succulents and yucca
- Compostable plastics (bioplastics)
- Coffee cups and pods
- Fats, oils and grease
- Food stickers (please remove from items)
- Gloves
- Hard shells (clams, mussels, oysters)
- Medication
- Palm fronds
- Paper napkins and paper towels with cleaning chemicals
- Parchment and wax paper
- Pet waste
- Rocks and soil
- Rubber bands and twist ties
- Tea bags
- Textiles
- Tissues and wet wipes

Under Senate Bill 1383, organic waste recycling programs must now accept both green waste and food waste. Approved in 2016, SB 1383 requires jurisdictions to provide organic-waste collection services to all businesses and residents. The bill aims to drastically reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 2025.

- Throw objects at the animal.
- Look the coyote directly in the eyes.
- Stand up if you are seated.
- If you are wearing a coat or vest, spread it open like a cape so that you appear larger.
- Retreat from the situation by walking backward slowly. Do not turn your back on the coyote.

The City of Cerritos contracts with Long Beach Animal Care Services to provide a wide range of services, including coyote management. The City of Long Beach has a comprehensive covote management plan and that plan serves as the de facto plan for Cerritos by extension of the service contract. The majority of cities in the region all have similar coyote management plans as each plan must align with the regulations established by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife.
